## Real moms give crash courses on kids

Oup two new Life Network series this fall devoted to the most hectic job on earth: Being a mom.

And former Rogers Daytime host Catherine Marion and actress Nicole Oliver know exactly what they're talking about.

Marion was just months into her first television job at *Daytime* last year when she was tapped to co-host Life's new daily series *The Mom Show*.

"I thought I'd be at Rogers for awhile then we'd see, maybe when

my kids got older we'd see, maybe I could go back to teaching ..." said Marion. "But I never in a million years ... expected something like this."

The former local model had a brief stint teaching primary school before she had four children in as many years. She credits accountant hubby Michel for pitching in with their daughter, son and twins, now 10, eight and six, so she could do *The Mom Show*. The producers film six episodes a week

during a 10-week shoot.
That schedule has Marion flying to Toronto
Sundays after dinner
and returning home
Wednesday nights until
early next month.

The daily daytime parenting show, which she co-hosts with Laurie Gelman, collects a panel of experts to offer tips

and advice about everything from parenting to marriage to fashion.

"I love that we have moms and

kids that are there ... no matter who we are talking to so they can jump in and say 'in my house —'" said Marion. "It's totally interactive."

Ottawa native turned Vancouver resident Oliver helms the other new show, Crash Test

Mommy. The show is a fun, weekly look at what happens when friends or family step in to a tough role often taken for granted.

"Crash Test Mommy says things like, 'If they were my kids they wouldn't behave that way' or 'I could do a better job,' "said Oliver.

Each weekend Oliver and her chosen mom head to a spa, checking out the resulting chaos back home via camera more than a dozen times a day. On some shows moms are watching a Crash Test Daddy, the kind of husband who after his raucous stint will probably

curb complaining about a lacklustre sex life or messy house or late dinners, said Oliver.

As a mom to sons who are two and six months, Oliver gets a kick out of watching candidates flounder.

"There's this old-fashioned, if I could say kind of '50s, June Cleaver perception about the mom. About how easy it should be and is," she said. "Watching it, it's gleeful and fun. As a mom it's a lot validating. People are struggling."

Oliver left Ottawa shortly before graduating from Lisgar Collegiate when her family moved to Toronto. After finishing York University theatre school, she headed for L.A. and spent four years on the David Carradine show Kung Fu: The Legend Continues.

She eventually moved to Vancouver, married a music composer and started her family. Oliver wasn't sure she'd be able to land a television gig so soon after delivering her second son.

"I was nine weeks post-partum at that point," said Oliver. "They said, 'Yeah that's what they were looking for."

The Mom Show premieres Monday at 11 a.m. Crash Test Mommy premieres Thursday at 8 p.m.
